

Unmasking the Problem

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Clinical Image

A 73-year-old semi-recluse female presented to the emergency department with a distal humerus fracture. As dictated by the COVID-19 pandemic regulations, she had been wearing a surgical mask (Figure 1) throughout the orthopedic evaluation. A routine COVID swab was ordered for which the patient removed her mask (Figure 2). The lady reported that a small sore had been present for years on her left nasal vestibule, rapidly progressing throughout the past months. Since this all took place during the pandemic, she avoided medical attention. A head and neck consultant performed an urgent biopsy and computerized tomographic scan (Figure 3). An ophthalmologic assessment confirmed left eye blindness. The histological diagnosis was basal cell carcinoma. Social distancing and lockdowns imposed by COVID regulations can apparently lead to postponement of medical attention and to otherwise avoidable devastating consequences. The fracture that led the patient to the hospital to begin with, was readily treated.

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
